Your task:

Draw what your fossil looks like and write a short letter to a family member to announce your discovery.

Include an explanation about:

- How you found the fossil
- When you found the fossil
- What you did to uncover the fossil (sorted through rocks, use equipment)
- What you think the fossil could be (fish, part of a dinosaur, insect)
- · Description of any important features of your fossil
- The name of your fossilised creature (you can make this up)
- What you are planning to do with the fossil (keep it, give it to a museum)



<u> Task 2 – Design-a-sarus</u>

For this activity, you are going to create a new species of dinosaur and describe the characteristics of your creation. Explain why your dinosaur has these features. For example: Does it have armour plates to protect itself? Does it have sharp claws to help attack its prey? Does it have a long neck to reach the leaves on trees?

You can create a fact file for your dinosaur or draw and label your new dinosaur.

Naming your dinosaur:

You could name your dinosaur "Dave" but as we are palaeontologists this week, our new dinosaur needs to have a scientific name. Different parts of the name mean different things.

For example: tyrannosaurus rex -> tyranno = tyrant saurus = lizard rex = king

Therefore, tyrannosaurus rex means tyrant lizard king.

Velociraptor -> veloci = speedy raptor = robber or thief

Therefore, velociraptor means speedy thief or speedy robber

DINOSAUR EGGS

What you need:

Vinegar

Food colouring or paint

Wax crayons

Cooking oil

Eggs (white eggs show the colours and patterns better)

The method we found best:

- Mix 250ml cold water with 2 tablespoons of vinegar and 5ml of food colouring.
- 2. Boil the egg for 6 minutes.
- 3. If you would like a pattern you can draw on the egg in wax crayon.
- 4. Place the egg in the dye solution for 6 minutes then remove.
- 5. When dry, rub cooking oil on the eggs to make them shiny.

Or you can simply paint them with any colour you fancy!

TIP! A traditional method is to hard boil your eggs for about 10 minutes with onion skins – the eggs come out brown but the bits of onion skin that press against them in the pan create patterns. You can also use coffee grounds, cochineal, red cabbage or flowers like celandine. You can wind string around the eggs first and they come out with spiral patterns on them or tie ferns or cow parsley leaves around the egg for intricate patterns.

> NOTE: Egg shells will absorb whatever you have painted onto your egg so we don't recommend eating it!

TIP! You could crack open your egg, put a baby dinosaur inside and make a nest for it!





DINOSAUR ICE EGGS

What you need: Balloon Small dinosaur Freezer Small chocolate egg in foil

Step 1

The tricky bit is getting the dinosaur into the balloon, so choose the smoothest dinosaur you have. The easiest way is to open the balloon with your thumbs and peel the balloon over the head of the dinosaur. The balloon ends up inside out but that doesn't matter. Once the dinosaur is inside do the same with the chocolate egg.

Step 2

Half fill the balloon with water (if it is too big it will take ages to freeze) then tie up the end. Initially the toy and egg might sink to the bottom but once the water starts to freeze you can squeeze the balloon and get them into the middle.







It takes a few hours to fully freeze but it is ready once it feels hard and you can't hear water when you shake it. Run it briefly under the tap to loosen the balloon from the ice egg and then snip the balloon off. Running it under the tap will also make it crackle which gives it a good visual effect!


You can leave the egg to melt or have a go at bashing it with a rolling pin!

French – Quelle est la date?

This week, we are going to look at how to write the date in French. It is similar to how we write the date in English but there are some punctuation differences.

In English, we use capital letters because the months and days are names. We also use st / nd / rd / th after the number (1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th).

In French, capital letters are not used and they do not have st / nd / rd / th after the number. For the first of the month, they use er after the number. Eg. 1er avril would be 1st April. 'er' is short for premier which means first.
