<u>Reading</u>

This week, you have two comprehension texts to read - both poetry-related. The first one is linked to Benjamin Zephaniah, a poet whose parents were from the Caribbean. The second one is based on a range of poetry. Both comprehension texts have questions for you to answer and are saved in the Year 5 English tab.

Spelling and Grammar

Under the Year 5 English tab on the website, you will find a series of 6 spelling and grammar learning sheets to work through, which are a progression from last week's sheets, to practise and revise rules we have learnt in school. You could do at least one sheet each day.

This week, we are practising creating nouns using the suffix -ship.

Below are your 10 spelling words for the week.

Can you find any other words that can be turned into a different noun using the suffix –ship? Look in a dictionary, look in your current reading book or research on the internet.

ENGLISH

Writing

Under the English tab, you will find 'The British' – a poem by Benjamin Zephaniah. You need to read the poem carefully and annotate (label) it with words and pictures that represent what is happening in each verse. (Just like you did with the City Jungle poem).

Then, you need to write your own poem about anything that inspires you. This could be our current theme unit – Sunny Saint Lucia, a hobby or skill that you have - or you could research some of Benjamin Zephaniah's other poems (or another famous poet's) and rewrite them. There is a template saved on the website to guide your poetry writing.


- 1. Regular and irregular polygons
