New Information

Uniform – we have sold uniform at cost price for the last 30 years. It is with mixed feelings that we announce that we will be phasing this out during this academic year. Whilst we acknowledge that buying uniform through the school provides convenience for some families, it takes a considerable amount of administrative time throughout the year and the stock occupies a lot of space. **Skoolkit** is our local supplier – they have a shop located in the Havant Meridian Centre and provide an **online** service with home delivery. They also offer discounts and free postage during promotional times in the year. We will



continue to sell uniform while stocks last, so please continue to order uniform through the online payment system. We will continue to sell QI book bags and P.E. drawstring bags as these are not available through Skoolkit.

How to report a Parking Contravention – we often receive complaints from parents and neighbours regarding inconsiderate parking in the roads near the school, during drop off and collection times. We encourage all those who witness contraventions to report these directly to Hampshire County Council's Parking and Traffic Enforcement department, using their online Parking Contravention form for anything you feel needs further investigation - https://www.hants.gov.uk/transport/parking/parking-contravention. You will need to provide the vehicle's registration number, make and colour, details of the contravention and the time and there is an option to upload 3 photos. Together, we can try to tackle this ongoing problem. Thank you.



November has been a very busy sporting month. Our children took part in the following sporting events:





- 20 children from Years 5 & 6 participated in a Gold and Silver Football competition. Despite heavy
 rain in the morning, the competitions took place under blue skies. After many hard-fought close
 scoring matches, QI Stripes won the Silver Cup and QI Greens came fourth in the Silver Cup division.
- 10 children from Year 1 went to a Multi Ball Skills Festival. They tried a variety of skills using different balls including dribbling a basketball, striking a football, passing a rugby ball and balancing a tennis ball.

Managing Children's Expectations at Christmas

It's that time of year again, lights are going up around the neighbourhood, days are getting colder, Christmas songs are playing on the radio... and while for some this is a magical time, for others it can create unwanted stress and can put a lot of financial pressure on parents.



A Barnardos article reported that from a very early age children hear from their friends about what they are getting from Santa, they're seeing toy ads on TV and they're being asked what they're getting for Christmas. Parents are under increasing pressure to deliver on these expectations, and may feel overwhelmed thinking 'How am I going to get my child what they want? How do I say no to what they've asked for?' On top of this, there is also the expectation that at Christmas, everybody will have fun and everything is going to be just perfect. This puts families under a lot of pressure this time of year.

Here are some helpful tips from Barnardos on how parents can manage their children's expectations this Christmas.

- Think before making any promises it's not easy to say no to your child, but making promises you can't keep can put you under immense pressure.
- What a child wants is not necessarily what they need focus on what's important for children at Christmas and all year round - that they have a positive family experience. This is much more important than any number of toys.
- Not bad parents! reassure yourselves that you are not bad parents if you can't give your child every
 toy they have ever wished for. Being honest with your child and explaining that Santa can't bring a
 certain gift this year will not have any long-term negative impact on your child's development. You
 could also find your own way to explain to your child that Santa is very busy at Christmas and will try
 his best to bring a surprise to everyone.
- Refocus take the focus off material things and back onto what's important at Christmas time.
 Remember that there is a difference between value and cost and the best times we have with our children often come with no price tag.
- Think of your own best childhood memories often these are memories of family time spent together
 rather than the gifts we got. A parent's best gift to their child is the time that they spend with them;
 this will create longer lasting memories for children.
- Teen's chat for teenagers and young people, sit down in advance and have a chat about what is
 possible for the family this year. Agree on a reasonable Christmas budget with your children. You will
 find they are often happier to forgo or substitute an expensive item when they have been involved in
 the decision.
- Include your children in the planning of gifts ask them to think about what they really need or want. If a child really wants a bike, they may not care about its newness, so a second-hand one painted up with decals and stickers to their own design could be just as pleasing!
